

GENDER & SEX EDUCATION POLL December 2020

CLIENT: Family First New Zealand

POLL DATES: Mon 14 to Thu 17 December 2020. The median response was

collected on Wed 16 December 2020.

TARGET POPULATION: Eligible New Zealand voters.

SAMPLE POPULATION: Eligible New Zealand voters who are contactable on a landline

or mobile phone.

SAMPLE SIZE: 1,000 respondents agreed to participate.

SAMPLE SELECTION: A random selection of 24,000 nationwide phone numbers.

WEIGHTING: The results are weighted to reflect the overall voting adult

population in terms of gender, age, area and deprivation.

SAMPLE ERROR: Based on this sample of 1,000 respondents, the maximum

sampling error (for a result of 50%) is +/- 3.1%, at the 95%

confidence level.

CODE COMPLIANCE: This poll was conducted in accordance with the Research

Association New Zealand Code of Practice and the

International Chamber of Commerce/European Society for Opinion and Market Research Code on Market and Social

Research.
